About The Residency

The Brooks IHL Pediatric Residency program prepares its residents to educate and care for the pediatric population. This program is one year in length and consists of three components that include didactic/psychomotor classes, clinical mentoring and supervision, and directed learning activities. In addition, case study presentations prepare the resident for participation in professional conferences and potential submission for publication. The program leverages relationships within the community and the Brooks Rehabilitation System of Care to allow for robust experiences in teaching, clinical practice, and research. Our Pediatric residents have the unique opportunity to gain experience in several practice settings including a neonatal intensive care unit. Additionally, residents from all of the Brooks IHL residency programs comprehensively participate in foundational courses, allowing for development of professional relationships with colleagues of various specialty practice areas.

The Department of Physical Therapy's Pediatric Residency Program is a post-professional clinical and didactic education program designed to significantly advance the resident's preparation as a practitioner of choice in the field of pediatric physical therapy. The program combines ongoing clinical mentoring with a scientific basis for advanced practice. At the end of the experience, the resident will be academically and clinically prepared to pass the American Board of Physical Therapy Specialties' (ABPTS) Pediatric Clinical Specialist examination.

LEND Program

Our resident(s) will also participate in the Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (LEND) program at CHOP. This program provides modules on community education, family collaboration, and interdisciplinary clinical programs. The LEND program is supported by a grant from the federal Maternal and Child Health Bureau.

Admission Criteria

- At least 1 year experience as a licensed physical therapist, minimum of 6 months in pediatrics preferred. A new professional who has completed a minimum of 6 months pediatric clinical education internship experience may be considered for the residency.
- Exhibits superior verbal and written communication and teamwork skills
- Possesses strong fundamentals in principles of clinical decision making
- Demonstrates ability to effectively interact with individuals of all ages, abilities, and cultural backgrounds
- Meets all eligibility requirements to be employed as a practicing physical therapist within the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia
- APTA and Pediatric Section Member preferred
- Eligible for Pennsylvania licensure

The Duke Pediatric Residency program's mission is to provide physical therapists with in-depth mentorship and didactic experiences in the management of pediatric patients across the continuum of care. Duke is a Level I trauma center with a Level IV NICU, consisting of 190 pediatric inpatient beds, 67 NICU beds and multiple specialty outpatient clinics. The children's hospital is consistently ranked #1 in NC and the Pediatric and Congenital Heart Center is ranked #2 in the nation by US News & World Report. The Duke Pediatric Residency emphasizes one-on-one, patient-centered mentorship and routinely exceeds the minimum number of mentorship hours required by the ABPTRFE.

Kennedy Krieger Institute Pediatric Physical Therapy Residency Program



Clinical practice: Patient care is organized into rotations differentiated by their practice settings within pediatrics, and each rotation is 8-14 weeks long. Clinical rotations include early intervention, school system, outpatient, inpatient rehabilitation, and acute care at the University of Maryland Medical Center (including NICU). Residents also see patients in a variety of specialty clinics. Residents receive one to one mentorship from expert clinicians during each clinical rotation.

Didactic and Scholarly Education: Didactic activities are interspersed throughout the residency program and are integrated into each clinical practice site rotation.

Residents will:

- Participate in KKI's Interactive Learning Modules and The Academy of Pediatric Physical Therapy's Residency and Fellowship Consortium with experts in the field of pediatric physical therapy.
- Participate in interdisciplinary education through Kennedy Krieger Institute's Maternal and Child Health Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (LEND) program, which seeks to prepare health professionals for the care of children and adolescents with neurodevelopmental disabilities, and to be leaders in their respective fields of practice.
- Participate in KKI PT department professional development trainings and have opportunities to attend grand rounds and other professional lectures provided by Kennedy Krieger and its partners.

Teaching opportunities: Teaching activities are interspersed throughout the residency program and are integrated into each clinical rotation. Residents will:

- Prepare and present scholarly in-service presentations for Kennedy Krieger Institute and the University of Maryland Medical System physical therapy staff.
- Prepare and teach pediatric lectures and labs in the DPT program at the University of Maryland.

Evidence-Based Project: Residents complete a year-long, evidence-based project in an area of their choice. Submit an abstract to a state or national conference or submit a manuscript to a peer-reviewed journal.

Program Details

The UM-NCH Pediatric Physical Therapy Residency Program was initially accredited in 2013 and offers licensed physical therapists an opportunity to gain structured educational and clinical experiences in a variety of pediatric settings, including: hospital/acute care, outpatient, school-based/Early Intervention, and specialty clinics: spasticity, neuromotor, seating, and hemophilia. In addition, residents lead and participate in hospital rounds, case presentations and/or journal clubs, and teach in the entry level DPT program at the University of Miami.

The academic component of the program takes place at the University of Miami, Department of Physical Therapy on the Coral Gables campus. Clinical mentoring takes place at Nicklaus Children's Hospital's main campus and satellite centers and at the University of Miami, Debbie School.

Our residents also participate with residents from other specialty areas of practice currently enrolled in other University of Miami Physical Therapy Residency Programs (Cardiovascular & Pulmonary, Neurologic, Orthopedic, and Sports) for select topics.

Program Benefits/Costs

Residents are employed full-time through NCH and are eligible for benefits during the Residency "year". This includes employer supported health and dental insurance, and paid time off (vacation, sick time, a personal day and six holidays). There are no tuition fees.

PROGRAM PURPOSE:

Our Mission

The mission of the Residency Programs in the Division of Physical Therapy and UNC Hospitals is to provide a superior, comprehensive specialist training to licensed physical therapists to meet the needs of North Carolina. For the UNC Pediatric Physical Therapy residency, this mission is applied to physical therapists and their work with pediatric patients.

Resident Program Philosophy

The faculty and staff of the Division of Physical Therapy and UNC Hospitals are committed to developing residents who are recognized leaders within pediatric physical therapy. Residents will develop excellence in examination, diagnosis, intervention, consultation, teaching and the integration of best evidence into the patient care they provide. They will develop as a resource for the community in pediatrics and will contribute to the profession through teaching, writing, and leadership. Graduates of the residency program will be prepared to sit for the ABPTS Pediatric Certified Specialist (PCS) examination.

MENTORSHIP:

You will learn from mentors with exceptional experience and who are experts in their specific areas of interest. Mentored time provided is a minimum of 4 hours per week, but may increase to up to 12 hours per week depending on the module content. This one-on-one learning with real patients under the guidance of clinical experts is the foundation of the program. Feedback related to individual goals and module specific content is provided at each mentored session. The mentors include the following highly experienced individuals:

CURRICULUM:

The program's curriculum is designed in modules that address all areas of the pediatric Description of Residency Practice (DRP). The didactic-only modules include the topics of clinical reasoning (2-3 weeks), evidence-based practice (throughout program), and teaching and learning (2 weeks). Clinical modules include both didactic and clinical content and include acute care (10-14 weeks), school-based PT (8 weeks), Early Intervention (8 weeks), and outpatient care (10-14 weeks). During clinical modules, the resident will have 4-16 hours of clinical mentorship weekly. Weekly assignments and module-specific mentor assessments provide the resident with regular benchmarks to ensure learning progresses throughout the year. There are 2 written exams and 2 live patient exams administered at approximately the middle and end of the program.

The resident will also participate in the interdisciplinary <u>Leadership in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities</u> (LEND) fellowship at the Carolina Institute for Developmental Disabilities, which involves clinical consultation

through $\underline{\sf RSI}$ and weekly participation in $\underline{\sf AHSC}$ 862/864: Developmental Disabilities Across the Lifespan I and $\underline{\sf II}$.

REQUIREMENTS:

The program has requirements for each resident in order to successfully complete the program. These core requirements include: 1500 hours of clinical practice including a minimum of 150 hours of mentored clinical practice, >300 hours of didactic learning and coursework, and 12 hours of community service. In addition, residents must successfully complete each module, live patient cases, and written exams at a score of 70% or better.

RESIDENT WORK SCHEDULE:

Residents will be involved in scheduled clinic work, mentored clinical work, didactic work and focused clinic time totaling between 40-50 hours per week. Given the nature of didactic work and other clinical opportunities residents should expect to spend 50-60 hours per week completing activities related to the program. Residents are given a limited number of vacation days to be used during the year. The schedule below provides a sample of what a typical week might look like. *Please note that all schedules are subject to change based on clinic staffing needs and mentor availability.

Didactic learning: This is academic learning time completed by the resident. They may include LEND courses, reading, self-study modules, mentor/resident discussions, laboratory and psychomotor learning activities. They may be completed via face-to-face, distance, or independent learning. Module mentors plan, administer, and evaluate didactic learning activities and their outcomes.

Mentored Clinic: This is clinical learning time in which the mentor and the resident are seeing patients together. The resident is typically leading the patient care with support and direction from the mentor. The mentor will be a licensed PT who is a residency program mentor.

Focused Clinic: This is clinical learning time in which the resident participates in activities related to the module topic which may include shadowing therapists in other disciplines, physicians, or observing surgery.

SALARY, TUITION AND BENEFITS:

Residents are paid a competitive salary and are eligible for full time benefits including health insurance, dental insurance, and paid time off. There is no tuition associated with the program.

ELIGIBILITY:

New graduates are eligible to apply and must have passed their licensure exam and hold a NC PT license by July 31st in order to be considered for admission. Completion of immunization requirements, HIPAA, OSHA, and CPR training prior to matriculation is required.







The Virginia Commonwealth University Pediatric Physical Therapy Residency Program

Program Mission: The mission of the Virginia Commonwealth University Pediatric Physical Therapy Residency is to provide licensed physical therapists a pathway to achieve pediatric specialization. Program graduates will be professional leaders contributing to society by providing culturally-sensitive, family-centered care; facilitating high value health related outcomes; and actively participating in evidence based practice, community engagement, teaching, and research. **Program Description**: This 12-13 month program provides opportunities for the resident to gain experience with a diverse and complex patient population by providing direct clinical practice hours and/or clinical observation in the 5 practice settings of acute care, outpatient, inpatient rehabilitation, early intervention, and the school system.

Residents will have mentored teaching responsibilities and exposure to research activities at VCU College of Health Professions Department of Physical Therapy.

The curriculum will include enrolment of the resident in the Va-Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental Disabilities (Va – LEND) program.

Direct Pt Care: Primary Rotations—Acute care and Outpatient- 6 months each- ~28 hours per week (2-3 mentorship sessions per week) = 1456 hours

Direct Pt. Care: Secondary Site- Early Intervention- 6 months- ~5 hours per week- (formal mentorship provided) = 120 to 130 hours

Affiliated Clinical Sites: Inpatient rehab and school system- Observation and setting specific assignments- 75 hours per setting = 150 hours

Community Engagement: 32 hours

Didactic Work: Va-LEND- 300 hours, Instructional Methods Module- 30 hours, Journal Club/Case

presentations/APTA-Peds Consortium Webinars- ~ 26 hours = 356 hours

Teaching/Research: Teaching Assistant in DPT program/research

initiatives/inservices/presentations/self-study = 84 hours

Total Program Hours = ~2200 hours
